Do the research on an App – What is it for? Payments? Age limit? How is the info shared? Privacy settings? Always read parents/ safety section.

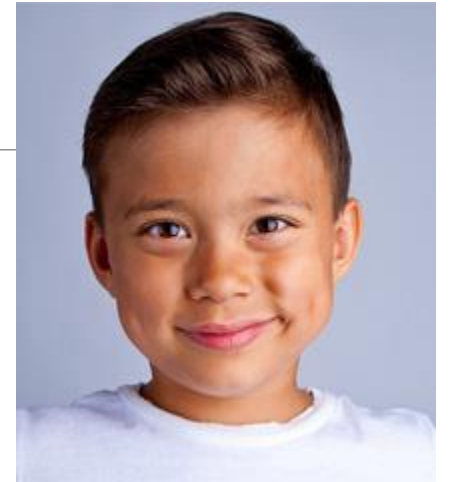
Do not give into peer pressure

Issues that we face

1. Unwanted contact/ grooming
2. Cyberbullying
3. Harmful content/ illegal materials
4. Privacy/ digital footprint

Unwanted contact/ grooming



Minecraft – well self policed at present.

Look out for bribery and gifts in the form of: online credits, emoji, cheats for games, extra points, flattery.

Be aware of sexualised games – strip poker, naked photo dares (Year 5's).

Threats

Blackmail

Cyberbullying

Children and adults affected, more and more prevalent.

Law coming up this year – illegal to impersonate someone online.

It is against the law to send indecent photos (70% girls).

Children as young as Year 5 are setting up Whatsapp groups where you have to leave a comment (e.g. We hate...).

Children do not understand that Whatapp is an online forum and Instagram is a website.

We have a responsibility to prevent children from viewing not age appropriate content (intentional or non-intentional).

Ensure children are not able to register on Skype, keep your passwords safe.

Privacy/ digital footprint (tattoo)

Under 5's should **ALWAYS** be supervised online.

Pay for Apps rather than using the Internet.

Turn off in App purchases.

Teach children to avoid playing games with people you don't know.

Beware of oversharing photos of your child with friends.

Dating Apps: 7% of Tinder are 13-17 year olds!

(Tinder, MeetMe, Badoo, OkCupid, Hot or Not – Location based, danger of unwanted contact)

Ban culture does not work – we can't condone, we need to support them.

Age restrictions

- Snapchat 13 + (photos disappear but anyone can do a screen shot)
- WhatsApp 13 + (lowered from 16 to 13 in line with similar digital communication tools)
Soon to be available video chat option
- Oovoo – adds multiple user video conferencing – risks of friends accepting strangers
- Omeagle 18 + and Chat Roulette – chatting to strangers, indecency a few clicks away etc.
- Whisper 18 + (non – video based), posting secrets
- Instagram 13 + posting completely public, gives away location, when you tag a photo, anyone can find you.
- Kik Messenger 17, Yik Yak 18 (17 with parental consent)
